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Brilliant defense By Barry Rigal

Enri Leufkens of the Netherlands found a brilliant defensive ploy against Argentina in this third-round match. Board 5. N/S Vul. Dealer North.

Leufkens, South, led the HJ and continued the suit, declarer ruffing. Declarer then drew three rounds of trumps

-- an error. Then he led a club to the queen, and it won! Leufkens ducked with the ace -- a most farsighted play. That was it for declarer -- he no longer was going to be able to set up dummy's clubs. He was able to win two more ruffing tricks and the SA, but that was all. Altogether he won six diamonds, a spade and a club for down 3.

At the other table, the Dutch East bought the contract for 2S and was set two tricks, so the Dutch picked up 9 IMPs on the deal.

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WBF Master Points

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What's happening in Group W of the Marlboro Bermuda Bowl? Your editors unanimously picked United States I, Netherlands, France and Indonesia as the likely qualifiers. But the standings indicate that only Indonesia is among the top four. Of course the standings can change radically at any time -- there is less than a match difference between the top and the bottom.

South Africa moved to the top with victories over Australia and the Netherlands and a tight loss to Argentina. And it's Argentina in second place after two wins and a 16-14 loss to France yesterday. United States I moved out of last place with a 25-0 blitz of France. The Americans now stand fifth, only one point away from the leaders.

Group E is following closer to form. Five teams are huddled near the top, and Brazil apparently is beginning to make a move after a very poor start. At the top is United States II, but Sweden and Italy are only two and three points behind respectively.

In the Marlboro Venice Cup, United States I, winner of the American Trials, lead the pack in Group W, and France, European champions, are far ahead in Group E. The French women won all three of their matches yesterday to move 14 VPs ahead of runnerup Great Britain. United States II, Japan and Australia are very much in the running in Group E.

The first round-robin will finish with this morning's match. Then the teams will be renumbered according to their finishing positions for the second round-robin.

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United States I vs. France

This Round 4 match was expected to be a fierce battle of giants -- two of the best teams in the world. But the giants were Americans Jimmy Cayne and Chuck Burger, who had a most remarkable set. Since Mark Lair and Mike Passell were having a solid game in the Closed Room, France was routed, 25-0.

The first American gain came on Board 1 when U.S. I bought the contract at 2H making in the Open Room while Lair and Passell drove the French to 3H in the Closed Room, defeating this one trick for 4 IMPs.

Both declarers ran into a horrendous trump split on Board 2, but both Paul Chemla and Mike Passell found the way to 10 tricks for a push. The swings in other matches were huge --4H doubled and redoubled made twice, and 4S doubled went down 1100 once and 800 several times. This was the hand: Board 2. N/S Vul. Dealer East.

Burger led the CA and a second club for Cayne to ruff. Cayne led a spade to the ace, and Chemla got the bad news about trumps when he led the 5 to the jack and queen. He played the jack on the spade return and ruffed in dummy. Next he cashed the HK and the DA, finessed to the H9, drew the last trump and cashed the high spade. This squeezed South so that it wasn't even necessary to take the diamond finesse.

Lebel opened a spade to the jack, and declarer led a club, South winning. Another spade went to the king, and the heart position was revealed on the next lead. However, declarer was able to prevail in approximately the same fashion as in the Open Room.

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France played Board 3 in both rooms, going down in each case for another 7 IMPs to USA I.

Declarer won the opening club lead with the jack and passed the S8, losing to the 10. A second club went to the ace, and declarer led a spade to the 9, losing to the ace. A third club was ruffed, but Cayne was able to overruff with the queen. The defense still had to come to a heart and a diamond, so the result was down two -- minus 200.

In the other room Lebel opened 1NT as South and played in 2H after Cronier transferred. This was not a success -- down two -- and 7 IMPs went winging to the Americans.

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France judged accurately on Board 4 to gain 7 IMPs. Board 4. Game All. Dealer West.

Lair was faced with a tough problem on his second bid -- either pass or 4H could be correct. He drove his opponents to an unmakable spade game, but Passell naturally thought that the save was called for. Down two.

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Swings abounded throughout both events on Board 5 -- there were four of 12 IMPs and four of 10 IMPs plus many lesser swings. This featured match was no different.

That 4D bid got the Americans to the makable game -- they lost only the two black aces for a 12-IMP gain.

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The bid made by Cayne on Board 6 could be described by different adjectives, depending on how successful the bid turns out. This time the bid was either daring or enterprising, maybe both. On another occasion it might have been called foolhardy -- you know, when it fails.

As you can see, with the likely HK opening lead, the hand is cold. And the opening lead in fact was the HK. But it turned out to be a ping-pong match, with neither side taking advantage of their early chances. Cayne won the heart with the ace, and if he now draws trumps and leads toward the HJ, he has his contract. However, he led a spade, and Chemla won with the 10. Chemla can now lead the HQ and another heart, and when Perron ruffs with the jack, the defense has set up the setting trick. But Chemla returned the DT to the jack, queen and ace.

Again Cayne can quickly score up his game -- but he led a heart. Again Chemla can beat the hand by returned another heart. And again he didn't -- he led another diamond. Now Cayne cashed his top trumps and claimed his game for a 12-IMP gain.

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A preempt by Burger set the stage for another big American gain on the next hand.

Certainly Perron has his double, although the doubleton club is a drawback. And Chemla's cards all look as if they are working, so his cuebid makes good sense. Perron chose hearts, but of course this fares extremely poorly what with the 5-0 trump break. The defense took two diamonds, a club and two trumps to inflict a two-trick defeat. The auction was altogether different in the Closed Room:

The French worked their way up to 3D, and the Americans allowed them to play it there. It didn't work out well -- the defense took three spades and three clubs for plus 200. That was 9 more IMPs to U.S. I. The Americans gained 2 more on Board 8 when they made 5S while the French were scoring up 3NT. Then came Board 9, which was strange.

This contract seems desitined to go down, but this was Cayne's day in the sun. Chemla led the SA, then after considerable though cashed the HA! Curtains for the defense! Without that lead there was no way for Cayne to avoid a club loser. But now he was able to pitch five clubs from dummy and score up his unlikely game. France got to a pedestrian 3H contract in the Closed Room, so the Americans gained 6 IMPs instead of losing 6.

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The Americans collected another 10 IMPs on the next deal.

The Americans were overboard, but as was becoming very clear, this was their day -- in spades. And spades played a major role on this deal. Perron, with reasonable logic, figured the SQ was the best opening lead. Burger won this, cashed two top clubs and led a third club to East's queen. The spade situation was far from clear, and so Chemla returned the S4. This went to the king, and Perron, also not sure about the spades, led a third spade. Suddenly Burger had his game --three spades, three clubs, two diamonds and a heart. That was another 10 IMPs to the Americans.

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On Board 11 France went down one in 3NT in the Closed Room and the United States also suffered a one-trick set in 4S in the Open Room -- a rare push.

Preemption paid off again for U.S. I on Board 12.

Cronier decided to open 1H, and that gave the Americans a chance to find their spade fit. On his second bid, Cronier

jumped to 4H, but it was too late -- Lair found 4S. The favorable diamond psoition and the 3-2 club break made the game a success.

At the other table finding spades was a major problem that the French were not able to solve. Perron opened 1C and Cayne leaped to 4H. Chemla doubled, and Perron could see no reason to pull. The contract was beaten one trick, but that still added 6 more IMPs to the Americans' imposing tally.

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Cayne came up with the right action on the next board as well.

In the Closed Room, Cronier opened 2C and Passell leaped to 4S. Cronier can hardly be blamed for trying 5H -- but it didn't work this time. Cronier had to lose two spades and a trump. In the Open Room, Cayne opened 1H and Chemla of course jumped to 4S. It looks tempting to bid on with Cayne's cards, but he found the right action -- he doubled. The defense took three hearts, a heart ruff and two diamonds for plus 800. That added 14 more IMPs to America's total. It was clear that U.S. I was well on their way to a super blitz.

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It really is amazing how differently players can see the same hand. Check the bidding on this deal.

He returned a heart to the ace, and Cayne returned another club after cashing the DJ. Declarer ruffed with the 10. The defense still had the trump ace, so the contract was beaten one trick. This contract had no chance and actually was beaten three tricks. 5 more IMPs to USA I.

America scored a double partial swing on Board 15, making 3S in the Open Room and scoring up 3H in the Closed -- 7 more IMPs. France got it back on Board 16, making 3S in the Open Room and 3C in the Closed. Boards 17 and 18 weren't all that interesting, but Board 19 was perhaps the most exciting in a set of fascinating deals.

Chemla led the CK and continued a club to the 10. Perron switched to his singleton diamond, and Cayne correctly took this in hand. He led a trump to the queen, and Perron

Then he led another spade, and when Perron played low, Cayne finessed the 7! When that worked, Cayne had his game.

But why did Cayne play West for four spades to the ace-10? The key was the fact that Perron did not lead a third club. Perron knew that Cayne would discover the trump position when Chemla would be unable to overruff declarer -- so he didn't lead a club. But Cayne was completely aware of what was going on -- he knew there had to be a good reason why Perron did not lead a third club. The only reason had to be that Perron had the trumps. So -- he electrified the vugraph crowd by finessing the 7. It was the only action in the entire match that drew applause from the crowd.

4S went down in the Closed Room, so America added another 10 IMPs.

The set closed with 7 IMPs to the French. Cayne and Burger were allowed to play in 3S and suffered a two-trick set. The French in the Closed Room also got to 3S, but Passell carried on to 4D and suffered a one-trick setback.

It was a remarkable set, with Cayne and Burger playing almost double dummy most of the way. But neither team was among the leaders after four matches -- the Americans were in sixth place and the French were at the bottom of Group W, a position very foreign to France.
