*The first was to provide encouragement for **Junior Bridge** at every level. National events, national trials and Zonal competitions would become much more competitive because they would offer the possibility of qualifying for a world title, the ultimate goal in any sport.*

My second purpose was no less important. I wanted young players to be introduced to the rigors of world championship play, and the high ethical standards demanded at this level, as early as possible.

*When you return home, you must set your fellow **Junior** players an example, not just in technical skill but in ethics, deportment and self control. Improvement comes from the top, and you are the players who will set the tone.*

We are fortunate, too, that the federation has chosen as the venue the renowned island of Bali, one of the most beautiful in the world.

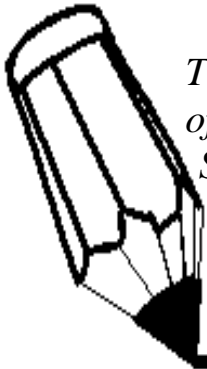

THE TOURNAMENT PLAN

Twelve teams of Juniors from all over the world are here to compete for the Junior Team championship of the world. Play will begin at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, July 9. Each team will play a 32-board match against each of the other teams during an 11-match round-robin that will conclude on Friday, July 14.

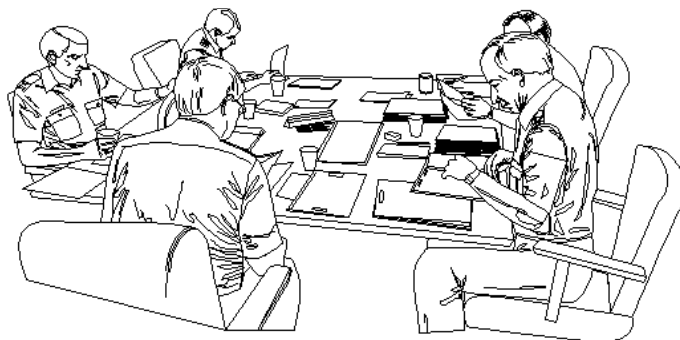
The four teams finishing highest in the round-robin then will go into the knockout phase. The team finishing first will have the right to choose their semifinal opponent. However, there is one stipulation -- if two teams from the same country both make the semifinals, they must play each other. The only possibility here is an all-United States match -- the U.S. is the only country fielding two teams.



The semifinal will take place on Saturday, July 15, and will consist of 64 boards. The winners will meet in a 96-board final -- 64 on Sunday, July 16, and 32 on Monday, July 17.

All s(h)orts of information ...

Smoking regulations

The WBF reserves the right to announce general restrictions on smoking. In any case, competitors will be expected to respect the wishes of their non-smoking opponents at the table. Spectators will not be permitted to smoke.

Who can watch in playing rooms

In general, the Closed Room really is a closed room -- no spectators except those specifically permitted in accord with Section 20 of the Supplemental Conditions of Contest. Those permitted in the Closed Room are participants assigned to that room, tournament directors, championship personnel, the president, chairmen of the Tournament Appeals and Youth committees, on-duty members of the Tournament Appeals Committee, hotel staff people as necessary, officials on duty as appointed, two members of the Daily Bulletin staff and a maximum of four approved journalists. Captains are NOT permitted in the Closed Room.

The Open Room is open at the start of play, but not thereafter. You must be in

the room at the start of play or you will not be allowed to enter.

Appeals regulations

Any appeal must be accompanied by a deposit of \$50 American. If the Appeals Committee deems the appeal frivolous, they have the right to not return the money -- otherwise the money will be refunded. Appeals must be lodged with the tournament director within 30 minutes of the posting of an official score for the session in which the ruling was made. All appeals must be made in writing on an Appeal Form. All appeals must be lodged by the team's captain or his designee.

VUGRAPH

Italy vs. Canada will be the first match on vugraph -- their match will start at 10:30 a.m. Sunday. The match chosen from the second round, starting at 5 p.m. Sunday, will be Great Britain vs. Denmark.

Ron Andersen of the United States is the chief vugraph commentator here, but he will not arrive in time for the first match. Barry Rigal of Great Britain will be the chief commentator.

In addition to the match

being featured, the progress of all other matches will be followed on another screen.

The team listed on the left in the schedule is the home team. As such it has the right to choose its opponents. The visiting team must commit itself, and then the home team may take its positions as it wishes.
